THE POWER OF CHESS COMES TO SBC's JUVENILE HALL



San Benito County Juvenile Hall invited Connecting Principles and Catalyst for Youth back this spring and we were able to begin classes in early May. Our Art and Chess programs are designed to enhance creative and abstract thinking and provide opportunities for positive interaction with adult role models, a key component in the Development Asset framework that has identified what young people need to be happy, healthy, contributing members of society.



Chess King Corp is offered every Friday night at 6:30 pm. Minors are paired off and the challenge begins. First, basic rules and tactics are explained and an example of advanced tactical training is offered depending on the level of understanding from the group. Then semi-formal tournament style play begins. If you can

call it play. Minors are quickly learning that play is deadly, powerful and fun. No one wants to loss and play time is quickly turning into their new found abilities to move pieces and take the game. Chess is known to increase and develop important cognitive abilities such as visualization, emotional intelligence, problem solving, memory, reasoning, originality and etiquette. Sounds too good to be true. It is very rewarding as a program provider to see a positive change in their interest in the game; little do the kids know how much they are really learning as their involvement grows deeper.

Catalyst for Youth's (www.catalystforyouth.org) Executive Director Joanne Hobbs is a seasoned digital media and expressive art teacher and works routinely with at risk youth in juvenile detention centers in the Bay area. This is her second year at the Hollister facility and she is delighted to be back. Art activity has been shown to enhance rehabilitation efforts. Findings from a study commissioned by Rethinking Crime & Punishment in 2002 showed that involvement in the arts is a "humanizing" experience. Its benefits include the creative activity itself as well as the by-products of engaging in art like an increase in self confidences. The positive impact of art programs in the criminal justice system fall into the following categories: educational achievement (learning a skill), improved behavior and attitude, reduced rate of re-offending, better ways of relating to other people and artistic, personal and social development (self-expression, communication, problem-solving skills, leadership, teamwork, etc.)

Chess King Corp (www.chesskingcorp.com) Daniel D. Dupre is the President of Chess King Corp and is happy to be in Hollister. He believes that all kids can excel once they believe in themselves and that kids of all ages have fun and reap the rewards and benefits that the Chess King Corp program delivers. Chess is an art, a struggle, a science, and a war. There are studies that show children that play chess show twice the improvement in reading and mathematics as their non chess equals and an acceleration and increase growth of IQ scores. Other studies show chess improves problem solving, develops discipline and critical thinking skills, increases concentration, teaches strategizing, improves communication and memory skills, teaches sportsmanship, confidence and facilitates character development. With all these benefits available it's no wonder Friday nights in JH have transformed into cauldrons of mental energy. It's been fun to watch the interest and skills grow.
